P TO PLAY LTTE CARD

n the topsy turvy week that was, Ms Srima Dis-sanayake who had preferred to be in the shadow of her hus-band who had been at band who had been at the forefront of poli-tics since 1970, be-came UNP's Pres-idential candidate. Most political analysts at the time of Mr. Gamini Dissanayake's Gamin Dissanayake s tragic death gave Prime Minister Chan-drika Kumaratunga the edge in the Pres-idential race Mr.Dis-sanayake who fought sanayake who fought his way to become presidential candidate only five weeks before his death was rallying his forces and attempting to heal rifts within the party.

The question now being asked is: What difference would Ms Srima Dissanayake make?

It is open know-ledge that Gamini Dissanayake loyalists such as Wickreme Weerasooria Dissanayake by the such as Wickreme such as Wickreme weerasooria. Susil Moonesinghe, Rohan Pethiyagoda soon after his death were mapping out a strategy to make Srima Dissanayake the candidate whereas former Prime Minister Ranil Wickremasinghe would have former Prime Minister Ranil Wickremasinghe would have been the obvious choice. When the UNP executive committee met at Siri Kotha on October 25th with President D. B. Wijetunga in the chair, a nomination committee was appointed with the objective of making the choice unanimous objective of making the choice unanimous and Mrs Srima Dis-sanayake's name had been proposed as the party candidate. This

met with strong opposition from some senior UNPers such as Mr Nanda Mathew who wanted Mr Rani who wanted Mr Rani Wickremesinghe as the candidate. Among those backing Ms Dissanayake were Messrs M. H. Mohamed Susil Moonesinghe Festus Perera and Wijeyapala Mendis. Mr Mathew had objected saying that some members of the nomination committee were canvassing nomination commit-tiee were canvassing on behalf of Ms Dis-sanayake. Among the party stalwarts who had remained neutral were Messrs Shau Hameed and Mr K. N. Choksy.

The pro Dis-sanayake group were seated in a separate room as negotations for the candidature were going on and finally a compromise

finally a compromise was arrived at. Ms Srima Dissanayake was to be the party candidate while Mr Ranil Wickremesinghe was to be appointed depu-ty leader of the party with effect from Octo-ber 25. When Presi-dent Wijsters 11. with effect from October 25. When President Wijetunga relinquishes office on November 10, he will be made the party leader. Mr Dham Wimalasena who succeeded Mr Gamin Wijesekera as General Secretary following the latter's death would relinquish his post of General Secretary in favour of pro-Ranil, Gamini candidate. Thus, he had got control of the party machinery and in the event of defeat of the UNP he would have time to re-organise the party which had suffered much since Mr. Ranasinghe Premadasa became the leader.


