In a statement issued here today, the LTTE's political committee said it would like to remind the Government of India what the LTTE leader, Mr. V. Prabakaran, told the Government of India's representatives when India applied pressure on the LTTE and tried to thrust on the LTTE "unreasonable" solutions: "You may make people, who value their lives and are after comforts, to toe your line. But don't want to live bereft of ideals".

> The LTTE said "To apply pressure on us, the Government of India seized our weapons in Tamil Nadu before our leader (Prabakaran) was invited to the negotiations in Bangalore about a year and a half ago. Then also, SAM-7s were seized from us. The missiles were later returned to us. Besides, the Government of India trained us on how to fire the SAM-7s after the Sri Lankan Government's "Operation Liberation" in the Vadamarachi area of the Jaffna peninsula". .

"During that period, it is not known whether, the Government of India was worried about which foreign agencies supplied us with these misslies. The Government of India had thought that if could use us as mercenary outfits for its own interests.

India is that we will not resile from our rights and function as the mercenary outfits of the Government of India", the LTTE said. "We are fully aware of the nature of the foreign help.' A good example is the killing of the people by India here. We are confident that we will win our independence with our people's support and without any foreign help", the LTTE added.

The LTTE also said it had never made public many instances of the Government of India's' treating it shabbily. "But we are duty-bound to explain our standpoint to our people when the Government of India, which calls itself the biggest democracy in the world and also its Prime Minister, twist incidents to justify their actions, keeping their interests inview".
